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Introduction

Londoners are renowned for their strong opinions. But where can you go to get Londoners' opinions on almost every subject from just one place? From the *Londoners' Charter* – a new far-reaching survey conducted and produced by Viewlondon.co.uk, the Londoner's guide to London.

The *Londoners' Charter* is a revealing insight in to how Londoners really feel about life and living in the capital.

The survey has been designed to incorporate every aspect of modern life, from the serious to the irreverent. The *Londoners' Charter* reveals Londoners' opinions on transport, education, the local environment and amenities, going out, shopping, love and family, to give the most up-to-date and definitive picture of what's important to Londoners.

The Londoners' Charter also contains genuine quotes from Londoners.

The *Londoners' Charter* is based on the results of an online survey of 1,000 Londoners.

Executive summary

The overwhelming feeling from the *Londoners' Charter* is that, while London has its flaws, it is one of the most exciting cities in the world in which to live. An appreciation of the sheer scale of London, both in terms of its cultural make-up and what it has to offer, pervaded many responses.

The city clearly gives its inhabitants a sense of being 'part of something' – a feeling that they simply would not get from living anywhere else in the country. It appears most Londoners are happy in the capital and do not envisage deserting the city any time soon. And if they did, it would be to emigrate abroad rather than relocate to anywhere else in the UK.

The capital's celebrated stoicism is also present in the report – high profile issues, such as terrorism and street crime, may grab headlines but they do not perturb Londoners. It appears that Londoners have a keen sense of perspective – for them, there is little point fretting about things over which they have no control.

They are, however, far more likely to be irked by the nitty gritty of London life, such as litter, graffiti and delayed trains. This feeling is exacerbated by the perception that these are things which *are* in the city's control, and can be remedied with monies provided by Londoners – the ever-increasing council tax rates and public transport fares.

Educational provision for their children is something of great concern to Londoners. But this anxiety is not something most would share with their MP – the survey reveals a city disaffected by the political system.

And while the capital offers a myriad of different career opportunities and wealth, nurturing relationships is what Londoners really care about. And it appears that the pub is as good a place as any to nurture these relationships – for most people living in the capital, relaxing means drinking.

Key findings

Work-life balance

Contrary to common belief, the main driver for Londoners is not work – 31 percent claim family is their main priority in life. Love and relationships are a close second (30 percent), while friends come third (15 percent). Career is of primary importance for only 13 percent.

The good – cultural diversity and tolerance

Much is made of the racial tension that exists in pockets of London, but the fact that so many cultures co-exist and flourish in the same city is a source of pride for many Londoners. Cultural diversity is cited as the best thing about living in London by one-fifth of those surveyed. Even when Londoners are faced with religious extremism, they do not allow prejudice to prevail – 81 percent of respondents say that their attitude towards ethnic minorities has not changed in the aftermath of the July 7 terrorist attack.

Also very popular with Londoners is the fact that the city is always a hotbed of activity and that it radiates a palpable 'buzz'.

The bad – litter, expense and public transport

Every Londoner is aware of crime but by no means does it tarnish their experience of living in the capital. When asked 'what do you dislike most about living in London?', crime scored just eight percent of the vote, while fear of terrorism doesn't even register. Rather, it is the city's litter and pollution that most riles its inhabitants (22 percent). The capital's transportation system is also unpopular (19 percent); and many Londoners cite the financial pressure of making their way in the capital as their biggest gripe (14 percent).

Committed to the capital

London's positives, however, evidently outweigh the negatives – more than one-third (36 percent) plan to live in London for up to five more years, almost the same number (31 percent) envisage staying for up to ten more years, and more than a quarter (28 percent) intend to remain in the capital for the rest of their lives.

Even those who do foresee moving out of the city to somewhere else in the UK want to remain within easy reach of London -23 percent said they would move to the Home Counties. Other regions of the UK were of little interest, with not one area

scoring more than three percent. The strongest lure came from foreign climes – 56 percent say that, if they were to leave London, it would be to live abroad.

Crime and terrorism

Despite high-profile incidents of crime and the dark cloud of terrorism, London is anything but a city living in fear. Nearly one-fifth of respondents (18 percent) say they feel very safe living in London, and nearly three-quarters (73 percent) say they feel fairly safe. Just eight percent say they do not feel safe at all. Meanwhile, nearly twothirds (64 percent) said they aren't worried about the threat of terrorism, with 79 percent claiming they have not changed one thing about their daily routines in the wake of the July 7 bombings.

Local environment

Londoners are not just proud of the capital in general, they also take pride in where they live. Nearly two-thirds (61 percent) say they find their local environment aesthetically pleasing, and 90 percent say they wouldn't be embarrassed to have visitors to their local area. That's no reason for local councils to be complacent, however – when asked what improvements they'd like to see to in their local area, the most popular response is cleaner streets. And again echoing the resolute nature of Londoners, only five percent say they'd like to see more police on the streets of their local area.

Education

One thing that does concern Londoners is their children's education. Despite nearly half of respondents rating the performance of their local school between 'excellent' and 'OK', more than one-third (36 percent) plan to send their children to a private school. High tuition fees won't act as a deterrent either – almost half of all respondents who are planning to snub state schools say they would compromise their own living standards to ensure their children received a private education.

Council Tax

Council tax continues to evoke passionate feelings – largely negative. Forty-percent of Londoners say they feel disgusted every time a council tax hike is proposed. Two-thirds of the capital are at a loss as to where their council tax actually goes, and more than three-quarters (77 percent) believe that their local authority does not distribute properly the council tax payments it receives.

Politics

The report also reveals Londoners' sense of political disenfranchisement and exposes the low opinion the city holds towards its elected representatives – just 12 percent of the capital believe their MP is in touch with their needs. According to the *Charter*, the capital's MPs are simply not putting in the graft, with a meagre 13 percent believing that their MP works hard enough. And when asked to evaluate the performance of their MP, Londoners are damning. Only three percent rate their MP as 'very good', with 24 percent rating them as 'good'. And if apathy really is the biggest threat to democracy, Londoners have sounded a warning to politicians, as more than half of respondents (57 percent) say they have 'no opinion' of their MP.

Transport

When it comes to getting about in the capital, Londoners prefer the tube (26 percent), followed by the bus (18 percent). The biggest grumbles about public transport are that it's overpriced (34 percent) and overcrowded (23 percent). Almost three-fifths of Londoners (59 percent) would welcome a 24-hour tube service.

Hospitals

Londoners harbour a low opinion of local hospitals, with one-third of respondents saying they are below standard and 15 percent claiming they are terrible. Forty-five percent of Londoners are worried about MRSA – which is, interestingly, nine percent more than those who are worried about the threat of terrorism.

Shopping

The capital is certainly not averse to retail therapy. Londoners' most popular purchases are holidays (17 percent) and clothes (15 percent). Central London is the preferred place to shop (34 percent), followed by the local high street (19 percent).

Local high streets are losing their identity, according to more than half of Londoners (55 percent). But if local businesses are heartened to hear that they are supported by 63 percent of Londoners, they may be less cheerful when they hear that they are supported only in spirit – the same number of Londoners actually use supermarkets instead of buying from local traders.

Drinking and eating out

Nearly two-thirds (60 percent) of Londoners said that keeping fit is important to them – but this doesn't mean they aren't partial to a drink. A quarter of Londoners go out

for a drink twice a week. Wine is the tipple of choice (22 percent), followed by beer (15 percent) and spirits (11 percent). Thirty-seven percent of Londoners prefer to enjoy a drink locally, while 31 percent make the trip in to central London. Soho is the most popular destination for those who do venture in to town.

Londoners are very fond or their food – nearly one-third (29 percent) claim to eat out once a week. Italian is the capital's favourite cuisine (17 percent), followed closely by Thai (15 percent) and Indian (10 percent). By far the biggest gripe about eating out is poor service (34 percent).

Love

Those looking for love in the capital may struggle – only 26 percent of Londoners are single; while those looking for a quick fix are equally out of luck, as only 24 percent said they would consider having a one night stand. Online dating is yet to grip the city's singletons – only 13 percent have used an internet dating website. And there's little room for manoeuvre for those likely to stray – 38 percent of the capital consider kissing someone outside of the relationship to be unfaithful.
